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R639 SALLYBROOK PEDESTRIAN CROSSING, GLANMIRE

1. Introduction:

This is the Part 8 Mangers Report for the R639 Sallybrook Pedestrian Crossing, Glanmire prepared pursuant to the requirements of section 179 of the Planning and Development Act 2000. The Managers Report is issued to each elected member of the Municipal District in advance of the decision being taken by the elected members on whether or not to proceed with the scheme.

The proposed pedestrian crossing is located approximately 2.8km north of Glanmire Village on the R639 at Sallybrook. The pedestrian crossing will be located on the R639 to the south of its junction with the L6987. Also within the extents of the scheme is the junction of the R639 and the L2973 which leads to Sarsfield Court Hospital. A number of large housing estates are located to the east of the proposed crossing location and the pedestrian crossing is being provided as a means to link these residential areas to the village of Sallybrook. The works will also have a traffic calming effect on the R639. The scheme is located within the 50 km/h speed limit zone of Sallybrook/Glanmire.

Cork County Council proposes to install a signal controlled pedestrian crossing and associated works including buildouts and signage, thereby;

- Improving road safety for vulnerable road users by the installation of a signal controlled pedestrian crossing and associated footpath improvement works.
- Improving road safety for all road users by provision of a right turn lane and associated works on the R639 which will have a traffic calming effect

The location of the junction and the proposed junction upgrade layout are set out on the attached drawings; R639S–LM-01, R639S-LA-01, R639S-LA-02 in Appendix B of this Report.

2. Principal Features of the Scheme:

Transportation and road design in urban areas is a complex issue and the needs of all road-users must be recognised and accommodated in the overall design. The prime objective for the Cork County Council Road Design Team is to design an urban pedestrian crossing scheme that achieves value for money and an acceptable standard of safety.

Having regard to the typical constraints found on urban routes and that this is a retrofit scheme (and therefore no private lands are to be acquired), the proposed scheme is designed to benefit all road users with a specific emphasis on vulnerable road users. Pedestrian crossing facilities in the area are limited. The provision of the signal controlled crossing will provide vulnerable road users with a safe crossing location. The proposed works will also provide a traffic calming effect on vehicular traffic on the R639.

Refer to drawing R639S-LA-01 & R639S-LA-02 for an overview of the proposed new pedestrian crossing and traffic calming scheme.

The following lists the principal features of the proposed scheme:

- Installation of a traffic signal controlled pedestrian crossing.
- Alterations to existing footpaths and installation of build outs.
- Alterations to existing drainage.
- Installation of new signage and road markings.
- Public lighting upgrades.

3. Part 8 Submissions and Repsonses:

4.1 Public Consultation Process

The public consultation process, under Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations 2001, was commenced in May 2016. A Part 8 Planning Notice was advertised in the "Irish Examiner" newspaper and a copy erected on-site on the 6th May 2016 (Appendix A).

Plans and particulars of the proposal were available for inspection by the public for a period beginning on the 6th May, 2016 and ending on the 17th June 2016 at Cork County Council, Glanmire Area Office, Ballinglanna, Glanmire, Co. Cork on each day during which the said offices are open for the transaction of business.

Submissions and observations with respect to the proposed development, dealing with the proper planning and sustainable development of the area in which the development will be situated, had to be made in writing on or before 5.00p.m, Friday, 1st July 2016.

It is not proposed to provide a Zebra crossing at this location. Pursuant to the requirements of Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations, 2001 as amended, notice is hereby given that Cork County Council proposes to carry out the following development: -

R639 Sallybrook Pedestrian Crossing, Glanmire

Location: The proposed pedestrian crossing is located approximately 2.8km north of Glanmire Village on the R639 at Sallybrook. The pedestrian crossing will be located on the R639 to the south of its junction with the L6987. The scheme is in the townland of Riverstown.

Nature and extent of proposed development: It is proposed to install a signalised pedestrian crossing and associated works on the R639. The scheme will include the following;

- Introduce a signalised pedestrian crossing with a central traffic island on the R639
- Alterations and extensions to existing footpaths.
- Installation of traffic islands and buildouts.
- Alterations to existing drainage.
- Public Lighting Upgrades.

Plans and particulars of the proposal will be available for inspection by the public for a period beginning on the 6th May, 2016 and ending on the 17th June 2016 in the following Cork County Council venue: -
